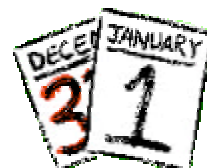

To help working photographers keep pace with the current linguistic changes, we humbly offer the following definitions.

ring flash -- A diamond ring catching the light.
