FIELD TRIP - Saturday MAY 21 Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge

(Note: this is a change of date from May 7)

Members can meet at the Will Rogers Garden Center, 3400 N.W 36th Street at 6:00 a.m,
--- **or** meet in the parking lot at the Visitor's Center at the Refuge between 7:30 a.m. and 7:45 a.m.
--- **or** meet for lunch at Meers at 11:00 a.m.

HOW TO GET THERE

Take I-44 South to Highway 49 (exit 45). Go west 10 miles to the Refuge gate. Driving time to the Refuge is about one and a half hours from OKC. Inside each of the Refuge gates you will find leaflet dispensers that have maps and information.

This is a favorite Metro Field trip with great photo opportunities along with the comraderie to become better acquainted with members of the Club. Buffalo, elk, and longhorn steer make good subjects as do the antics of the prairie dogs. Lakes, streams, boulders, and wildflowers challenge the photographer. More than 50 mammal, 240 bird, 64 reptile and amphibian, 36 fish, and 806 plant species thrive on this important refuge.

The Refuge has good hiking trails for novices or seasoned hikers. The Dog Run Hollow Trail system has trailheads at French Lake, Boulder, Lost Lake, and the Dog Run Hollow parking area. The Elk Mountain Trail System has two separate trails; one through the Charons Gardens Wilderness area, and other which leads to the top of Elk Mountain. And certainly Mt. Scott affords great views and sunset photo opportunities.

JOIN THE LUNCH BUNCH AT MEERS RESTAURANT on May 21

Perhaps we can learn of changes certain to have occurred at Meers since the following news article was written

Excerpts from: "Age Before Beauty: Meers Restaurant's Draw is it's Atmosphere" by Joan M. Biskupic
Oklahoma Report from the Daily Oklahoman (1991)

Meers --- If you don't have to swerve to miss a yapping black dog that races any car that goes by, or once you have regained your composure, if you don't see a hand-stenciled sign for Billie's House of Beauty, you've taken the wrong road.

The two are landmarks on an otherwise unexceptional four-mile Comanche County road off State Highway 58 that leads to the turn-of-the-century Meers diner. Around here, the rickety eatery is second in age only to the hills.

Under new ownership, (1991) the Meers restaurant reopened it's postoffice, began a monthly newspaper featuring pages from the 1903 Mount Sheridan Miner, expanded it's menu beyond the half-pound Meers burgers and hired 80 year old Flora Ward to play piano on weekends.

The diner was built during the Wichita Mountains gold rush. It's checkered history auttracts visitors as much as the plate-size hamburgers created in the mid-70's by then owner Al Foster. The Meers' burger, served on a seven-inch bun, cost \$3, or \$3.25 with cheese.

The mining town was named for Andrew J. Meers, an early-day mine operator, and was built in what is now the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge. Prospectors relocated the town one mile north across Medicine Creek when the federal government established the Wichita forest preserve. Despite claims by the original Mount Sheridan Miner newspaper that "gold and silver in large quantities in the mountains can no longer be doubted", the gold boom was more rumor than reality

By 1905, the town of Meers had seen it's hey-day, boasting a population of about 500. The Meers store, which eventually was moved one-half mile north to its present location, is the only survivor. The building expanded in the 1920's and in 1934, new owner Joe Maranto said in an interview last week. And it looks as though no one has touched the red, yellow and gray exterior since.

"We're afraid to work on it," Maranto said, "that the roof might crumble"... But we're going to have to do something with the exterior...The oldest section is supported by timbers sitting only on piled rocks. A raised wooden walkway is reminiscent of the old West.

The inside, replete with relics of the mining days, also has been renovated recently. A guest book included entries from far and near, including Egypt, but the Meers diner is not for the fastidious or the fast-moving... Patrons say, however, the place is as clean as it has been in years.

Customers have had to wait for a delivery truck to arrive with hamburger buns, and the store newspaper apologized last month for a 20 person line at the one bathroom in the building. The restaurant seats 76 people.

It's not unusual to hear talk at Meers of gold in the Wichitas. After Silar Lee Ison, the last of the Wichita Mountain prospectors died in 1972 and a smelter was found on his land, "A lot of people have been lookin", Maranto said.

Though the roads are not marked, the Comanche County sheriff's department refers to the road going east of the Meers diner, which meets State Highway 58, as Meers Road. The one heading south is called simply County Highway. A little more than a mile south, that road meets the wildlife refuge's Scenic Highway.

Maranto, 53, first ate at the Meers diner in 1961, when Lee and Glady Myers owned it. "Something deep inside me said, "you're going to own that business someday," he said. The Myers owned the restaurant for 20 years until the late '60's, and often were noted in local and state newspapers for their hamburgers and homemade pies.

Mananto bought the Meers diner from Foster last June (1991) for \$68,000. He also bought three-fourths of the land on which the building sits from Charles and Merrole Dickens. Maranto bought the one acre site for \$50,000, then incorporated all his holdings into Meers Store, Inc. The land had been Dickens' since 1968, according to Comanche County records.

It was about 1968 when Dickens surveyed the land and people realized the store was on two pieces of property", Maranto said. Until then, everyone thought it was all Rowe's property."

Wayne Rowe, whose family has owned several acres in the area since 1925, leases a small pie shaped piece of land about 40 feet long to Maranto.

In 1978, the building was added to the National Register of Historic Places. The proclamation hangs on a wall beneath a row of old soda pop bottles -- Triple AAA Root Beer, Sun-drop Cola, Virginia Dare, Delaware Punch.

Maranto's daughter, Lisa, 21, helps run the business and began the monthly newspaper, which includes recipes and the editorial statement that it "will print nothing but good news".....
