
Field Trip July 23 - Oklahoma City Zoo

A Bit of Photographic History

AMBROTYPES

Frederick Scott Archer's journal article published in The Collodion Process on Glass" Chemist in 1851 started research among photographers which resulted in James Ambroe Cutting's English potent of July 26, 1854 for the Ambrotype. In general the ambrotype is a mirror image created by a collodium base which after processing staved on its glass base and with this plate placed over a black background allowed reflected light to display it as a positive image. photographers really liked this method because it was both easier to prepare and cheaper than the Use of the ambrotype peaked daguerreotype. quickly, c. 1856-1857. Two practical problems with this medium caused a quick demise and very few examples made after 1864 have so far been found. The first problem was post production cost. ambrotype glass plates were made in the same sizes and shapes as daguerreotype plates. The plate was then like the daguerreotype sandwiched into a protective but still not inexpensive case. The second problem was the fragility of the image. It was easily broken by the accidental droppage of its case. Today most ambrotypes are discarded because of a third problem which took years to surface. The black paint placed on the back sides of the glass panes supporting the thin colloidion emulsions has begun to flake off so that viewed from the front the images appear defective. In most cases replacement of the black backing brings the image back to its full glory. -----

The pilot was silent for a moment; finally he stammered, "You mean you're not the flight instructor?"
